HS2 Update

Old Oak and North Acton | Summer 2025

High Speed Two (HS2) is the new high speed railway for Britain. Their contractors, Balfour Beatty VINCI SYSTRA (BBVS) and Skanska Costain STRABAG (SCS) joint ventures, are continuing works in Old Oak and North Acton to build the new railway.

Victoria Road Crossover Box

Work continues to progress at pace at the Victoria Road Crossover Box (VRCB) site in North Acton.

We have started assembling the concrete framework, which will form part of the visible superstructure of the future headhouse and shaft. This milestone marks a significant step in the transformation of the site, following years of belowground excavation and tunnelling works.

The headhouse will eventually provide vital access to the underground shaft and provide ventilation, emergency access,

and maintenance of the HS2 railway system beneath London.

This above-ground phase will see the installation of reinforced concrete and future steel components, designed to create a strong and durable frame that blends functionality with architectural design. Once complete, the headhouse will be finished with cladding and other external features in line with planning and environmental considerations.

The start of the concrete structure is a clear sign of progress, as the VRCB site evolves from having the main operations taking place underground to a visible piece of future infrastructure for the highspeed railway.

As you may have seen in the media, the HS2 programme is undergoing a reset which includes reviewing the entire programme cost and schedule. As a result, we are still finalising the details for the long-term closure of Old Oak Common Lane taking into consideration the reset of the wider HS2 programme.

However, we can confirm the road will not close before the spring of 2027.

HS2 drives £10 billion into West London

A new study by the consultancy, Arcadis, shows that the arrival of Old Oak Common Station will boost the local economy by £10 billion over the next 10 years, and the area around the station is described as the capital's new development hotspot.

The study is set out in the report, *From trains to cranes: HS2 and the West London development boom,* and outlines how planning applications in the 1.5-mile radius around the station site have increased by 22% since Royal Assent for HS2 was granted in 2017. The total value of the planning applications submitted so far is £3.41 billion over the past seven years - an increase of 325% from the previous seven-year period. It is also estimated that the arrival of the station will generate over 22,000 new homes and almost 19,000 new jobs in the local area.

In the past, businesses around the station were mainly in the retail, wholesale, and logistics industries – now, the area is being transformed into a hub for high-tech jobs and innovation. Along with this, annual salaries in the area are predicted to increase by over £1,500 per year.

Ealing residents benefit at Old Oak Common

Two HS2 apprentices from Ealing will now enjoy a free university education and a four-year extension to their employment contract at Old Oak Common.

After completing their two-year apprenticeships with Balfour Beatty VINCI Systra (BBVS). IT Support Engineer Tyler Pearce-Scott and Apprentice Civil Engineer Charlotte Thomas impressed the site team with their hard work.

Charlotte, a former Brentside High School pupil, joined BBVS to study a Level 4 Civil Engineering apprenticeship. Since joining the company, she has played a supporting role in the design and construction of the 850-metre-long station box, and the team could see she has a promising future.

Eager to retain and upskill local talent, Charlotte was offered a new four-year contract, along with a fully funded BEng Civil Engineering degree. She now spends two weeks of every month studying at the University of Exeter and the remaining two weeks supporting construction of the new superhub station.

Charlotte, 21, from Ealing said, "My HS2 journey began at my local high school in Ealing. An initial conversation with HS2's skills and employment team led to me securing a work experience placement, and when the opportunity to apply for an apprenticeship came along, I didn't hesitate to go for it. I would have never imagined that I'd progress to studying civil engineering at the University of Exeter."

Tyler also showed great potential after joining BBVS to study for a Level 3 Information Communication Technician apprenticeship.

Digital technology plays a huge role in the behindthe-scenes design and planning for the station's construction, and he consistently demonstrated a strong work ethic and high skillset.

He too was rewarded for his efforts and will now progress onto a Level 6 Digital and Technology Solutions apprenticeship, enabling him to study for a BSc Digital Technology Solutions degree at the University of Roehampton.

Tyler, 20, from Ealing said, "I was studying for my A-Levels and realised part way through that it just wasn't for me. I wanted a career in IT, but as a teenager, it was hard to find a way in. Securing an apprenticeship on such a huge project has opened a whole new world for me."

SCSJV launches groundbreaking Hazard School at Willesden Euroterminal site

SCSJV has unveiled a pioneering Hazard School at its Willesden Euroterminal site — a unique training zone designed to copy real-life construction scenarios in a safe, controlled environment. The initiative provides contractors and apprentices with the opportunity to practice identifying and responding to on-site risks before facing them on live projects.

This hands-on approach supports a strong safety culture and boosts confidence among workers, making sure they're better prepared on various site tasks. The Hazard School is already proving to be a powerful learning tool and is set to be submitted as a best practice innovation to the Considerate Constructors Scheme (CCS).

SCSJV hopes the concept will set a new benchmark for construction training and inspire wider adoption across the industry, enhancing safety standards on projects nationwide.
